From the Executive Director

Eloise Damrosch, RACC Executive Director

First, I want to thank the many people who have sent me words of congratulations and encouragement over the past couple of weeks. That kind of support underscores for me personally that I made the right decision in taking this new post.

Many people who know that I served as Interim Executive Director twice before have asked, "why now and not then?" The simple answer is, "timing is everything." RACC has undertaken some important initiatives over the past few years and I am determined to continue this forward momentum with the help of the new management team, the entire RACC staff, and all of our partners in the region and the state.

I will still oversee the Public Art Program especially as 2005 marks the 25th anniversary of the Percent for Art program. We have much to celebrate.

This arts and culture business is one I am passionate about and have worked in for most of my professional life. Hopefully 12 years of college teaching, 20 years of arts administration and a lifetime of loving the arts have prepared me to lead RACC.

And, I want to prove to the Car Talk guys that people with art history degrees are employable. Please be in touch - we'll succeed together.

The Regional Arts & Culture Council (RACC) board of directors has named Eloise Damrosch as its new Executive Director, following David C. Hudson's departure in May.

Eloise has spearheaded numerous public art initiatives since 1988 when she became Public Art Director for Portland's Metropolitan Arts Commission, and has served as RACC's Public Art Director since MAC became RACC in 1995. Over the years, Eloise has earned a local and national reputation as a respected arts administrator while helping create one of the best-known public art collections in the country.

Recently Eloise worked with Mayor Katz's office to install a gift from our Sister City, Guadalajara — *Mago Hermano*, a bronze sculpture by Alejandro Colunga — at the Portland Center for the Performing Arts (see *Art Notes electronic edition*, June 2004).

Among her other credits, she oversaw the selection of public artwork for the newly expanded Oregon Convention Center, and won national recognition by bringing remarkable artwork into the new Doernbecher Children's Hospital. Eloise has advised public art projects in Washington, Arizona, Tennessee, and Taipei and is currently developing public art for the new Denver Children's Hospital.

Before moving to Portland, she lived in Central Oregon, teaching art history at Central Oregon Community College and running Cascade Bookstore in Redmond. From 1987 to 1995, Eloise served as

Commissioner — and later Chair — of the Oregon Arts Commission. She graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Wellesley College and earned an M.A. in Art History from Columbia University.

“I am delighted that Eloise has accepted the position of Executive Director at RACC,” declared Portland City Commissioner Erik Sten, who oversees the City’s arts portfolio. “Her skills are an extraordinary asset to the local arts community, and I look forward to working with her in our efforts to continue building a flourishing artistic community in Portland.”

Eloise will retain a strong focus on Public Art thanks to the promotions of two senior managers at RACC, who will share some executive leadership responsibilities.

Cynthia Knapp becomes Director of Operations for RACC, overseeing the grantmaking programs along with the overall fiscal management of the organization. Jeff Hawthorne was named Director of Community Affairs and will be responsible for increasing resources for RACC and its constituents, including administration of the workplace giving program during its vital second year expansion this fall.

This leadership team has announced some of its additional priorities for 2004-05, including expanding RACC’s role as an arts provider in the Multnomah County Schools Uniting Neighborhoods (SUN) program, and expanding the Cultural Leadership Program and Capitalization Grants Program that were launched by NW/BCA and The Capital Initiative (TCI) several years ago. Also in 2005, RACC will be celebrating the 25th anniversary of Portland’s Percent for Art Program.

News from the NEA:

• **NEA Amendment Passes.** On 6/16, the U.S. House approved the Arts Caucus Amendment to increase funding for the NEA by \$10 million and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) by \$3.5 million by a vote of 241 to 185. Thanks to art supporters here in Oregon and around the country, Congress received more than 3,000 messages in 48 hours in support of this issue. Oregon's Rep. Earl Blumenauer spoke in support of the bill: "I hope amendment approval will move us back in the direction that we need to go," he stated. "We are scrambling here for less than \$14 million that has such a vital connection to our communities...It is a tragedy that we are not meeting even what the President had requested." • **Oregon winners of 2004 NEA National Heritage Fellowships.** Yuqin Wang and Zhengli Xu of Aloha, Oregon, Chinese rod puppeteers, were awarded this prestigious fellowship of \$20,000 in recognition of their artistic excellence, cultural authenticity, and contributions to their field. After many years traveling with the Puppet Art Troupe in China, they moved to Oregon in 1996, where they have shared their artistic tradition through the Oregon Folklife Apprenticeship Program and RACC programs.
