One of the most exciting activities here at the Regional Arts & Culture Council is the annual awarding of our Individual Artist Fellowship. This year we honor an outstanding artist in the Performing Arts and I am thrilled to announce - it is **Thara Memory!** An outstanding group of panelists met in a two-tiered process and unanimously came to a decision. We will feature Thara in our Fall newsletter, but in the meantime - a very short bit about this amazing man's achievements.

Thara Memory is a brilliant and passionate musician whose contribution to the Portland music community spans over 35 years. He is one of the most talented jazz performers this area has to offer, but he is also a composer and a master teacher who has devoted his professional life to working with young people from all walks of life to open their eyes to the power of music.

With the RACC Fellowship funds, Thara plans to dedicate more time and energy to his jazz clinics and workshops offered to high school band programs while continuing his conducting work with not-for-profit community orchestras such as Pacific Crest Sinfonietta and Diminuendo Wind Orchestra.
