RACC Provides \$89,600 in Grants for Special Opportunities & Emergencies

From the Executive Director

With the glorious arrival of another Portland spring I am very pleased to introduce our readers to three new members of RACC's team. Not only are they immensely smart and talented, and artists, but they also contribute to gender balance - they are male! We welcome them and hope that many of you will meet them soon.

Keith Lachowicz is the Public Art Collections Registrar, meaning he oversees the 2,000 plus works in the City and County's Public Art Collections. He keeps records, juggles data bases, schedules routine maintenance and special conservation, and with the Public Art Collections Preparator, moves art around in dozens of public buildings, keeping experiences of the art dynamic and, hopefully, city/county employees happy.

William Rihel, our new Preparator, helps with all technical aspects of art handling - packing, moving, hanging and storing public artworks. He is the go-to person for city/county employees who want "new art" or who need to report a problem with art in their space.

Robert Longacre joined the Work for Art team - our United Arts Fund, through which we raise significant dollars in over 50 workplaces for regional arts organizations. Needless to say this program requires substantial administrative coordination and Robert has all the skills to tackle this big job.

As RACC's program offerings grow we are pleased to be able to hire new people. Work for Art is only three years old but has taken off like a rocket. The public art collection grows annually and will more rapidly with the recent increase from 1.33 to 2% set aside in construction projects for public art. We are diligent in keeping overhead costs as low as possible, while providing the best services and most dollars possible to the arts community in our region.

A new RACC grants program is providing extra help for local arts and culture organizations with emergency needs and unique special opportunities. In April, with new funding from the City of Portland, RACC allocated \$89,600 in **Opportunity Grants** to five Portland-based arts and culture organizations.

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• Hand2Mouth Theatre received \$5,050 to help fund a special opportunity to collaborate on a major bi-lingual theatre project entitled Two Cities. RACC funding will support the initial rehearsal residency for H2M company members in San Miguel Allende, Mexico in May 2007. Upon return to Portland, H2M will host a public video showing and a small performance in June 2007. The complete performance will premiere in Portland at Teatro Milagro in July 2008.

• Pacific Northwest College of Art received \$30,000 to co-present the world's first Animation Installation Competition during the Platform International Animation Festival in Portland from June 25-30, 2007. PNCA developed this opportunity after Portland was selected as the site of the animation festival in the fall of 2006. The competition will showcase world class mixed-media artists, and installations will be presented throughout PNCA's campus. PNCA will also host a symposium, lectures, and street party, and all events will be free and open to the public.

• **Portland Actors Conservatory** received \$7,500 to help ensure national accreditation of its Conservatory Program. RACC funds will pay for a required audit of the organization's last three fiscal years, and will help the Conservatory hire a Project Manager for six months to oversee implementation and fundraising for the new accredited program.

• Portland Taiko received \$27,000 to recover from the sudden loss of a highly skilled artistic staff member. Unanticipated expenses resulting from this emergency include contract fees for replacing the artist, travel expenses, and recruitment funds that will help Portland Taiko maintain its commitments for an April concert in Portland and other school and touring shows this spring.

• Solo Flamenco received \$20,050 for a special opportunity to bring eight renowned artists from the birthplace of the Flamenco – Jerez de la Frontera, Spain – to Portland for the NW International Flamenco Festival. These Sonidos Gitanos artists will provide local residents with the unique opportunity to view world-class performances and participate in five days of intimate workshops during the festival.

Nine eligible applications were received between January 1 and February 5 for Cycle 1. Applications are still coming in for the Cycle 2, and those awards will be announced on May 25. Funds will be available for several more cycles throughout the year, and in future years as well.

"These Opportunity Grants are designed to provide one-time assistance for Portland-based arts and culture organizations when unique opportunities arise outside of their regular programming," said Cindy Knapp, Director of Operations of the Regional Arts & Culture Council. "Funds can also be requested to respond to an organizational emergency. It's a way for RACC and the City to help when our arts and culture organizations have a special need."

Funds typically go to arts and culture organizations that can demonstrate a unique artistic opportunity with benefits for the local community, and to those with an emergency beyond their control. Organizations that could submit a similar proposal through RACC's existing grant programs (general support grants, project grants, and professional development grants) are less competitive in this program. In addition, the guidelines state that capital projects, scholarships, and funding deficits are not eligible for funding through this program. For complete guidelines, visit www.racc.org/grants.

All Opportunity Grant funding decisions are recommended by a panel that consists of: Jesse Beason, Office of Commissioner Adams; Eloise Damrosch, RACC Executive Director; Jeanette Pilak, Arts Administrator and Consultant; and Tad Savinar, Artist and RACC Board member. The RACC Board of Directors ultimately approves the panel's recommendations. Because these grants are designed to assist with special one-time needs, organizations that receive funding through the Opportunity Grants program cannot apply for these funds again for 24 months after the activity is completed (although they remain eligible for funding through RACC's other grant programs).
