RACC Distributes Urgency/Stability Funds

RACC, in partnership with the City of Portland awarded 196 artists \$450,000 through the Urgency/Stability Support for Artists grant program, a part of the American Rescue Plan: Investing in Portland initiative.

The Urgency/Stability program, led by Grants Specialist, Molly Gray was designed by the RACC Team members, with feedback from three community artists. The intention of the grant was to support artists and other creatives working in the arts who identify as under-served or under-represented, including Black, Indigenous, Latinx, Asian, Pacific Islander and People of Color; LGBTQIA+ artists; and artists with disabilities.

Grants between \$500-\$5,000 were made to support artists and other creatives working in the arts who live in the City of Portland. had lost income or opportunities due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, and had an ongoing practice creating work and sharing it with the community.

Statements submitted by a grant recipient:

"I broke out into tears when I learned I'd be a recipient of the Urgency/Stability grant. I've lost so much in the last 2 years – this money is life-sustaining. It will give me time and space to heal and invest in my artist practice.

INDÍGENA's Installation Project: We Are The Land

The City of Portland Office of Tribal Relations initiated a project with artist Josué Rivas to install portraits of indigenous community members around the City in acknowledgement of Native American Heritage Month. Rivas is the visionary behind the project and the founder of INDÍGENA, an Indigenous storytelling collective. He and Samantha Hanlin (also from INDÍGENA) created the portraits and were the leads on the wheat pastings. One of the installations is on the side of the building that houses the RACC office, 411 NW Park. RACC has been a co-sponsor and fiscal agent for this project along with the City Arts Program, Multnomah County, Metro, the City's Diverse Empowered Employees of Portland Program, and Northwest Natural. Oregon Live recently published an article about the project, which includes photos of the portraits at the various locations. OMSI has the biggest of the installations, and they also appear on several Multnomah County buildings. A map of the locations can be found <u>here</u>.

The dedication on the installation at RACC reads:

INTENTION

WE ARE THE LAND IS A COLLABORATIVE PROJECT THAT AIMS TO SHARE THE DIGNITY, BEAUTY, AND STRENGTH OF THE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY. THESE IMAGES CONNECT US TO THE LANDSCAPE OF THE CITY AND INCREASE OUR VISIBILITY. INDIGENOUS PEOPLES ARE THRIVING HERE DESPITE COLONIZATION. WE HOPE TO OPEN YOUR HEARTS TO A CONVERSATION THAT CAN SERVE AS A VEHICLE FOR TRANSFORMATION, HEALING AND VISIONING.

WHAT IS YOUR MESSAGE TO FUTURE GENERATIONS?

Thank you Josué, Samantha, and all who helped to make this installation happen. Most of the installations will be up through the end of the year, with the exception of OMSI, which will have a longer run.
